## Profile learners with the EMP lens

Use the

Emerging–Mentee–Peer (EMP) model to tailor facilitation.
Emerging learners benefit from scaffolds and confidence-building; mentees seek growth via mentorship and collaboration; peers bring deep experience and value reciprocal learning and leadership opportunities.

## Make co-learning explicit —and shared

Invite learners to co-plan activities, try tools together, and surface what each person knows. Co-learning honors adult autonomy, builds community in synchronous or asynchronous settings, and models the shared responsibility required for responsible AI use.

## Teach "critical critique" with a repeatable check

Build Al literacy by having learners evaluate outputs for accuracy, bias, fit, and usefulness (e.g., a simple rubric like a "fluff test": re-prompt, verify, and iterate when anything is off). Emphasize transparent citation or disclosure of Al assistance to normalize ethical practice.

This session reframed adult education for an Al-enhanced world by introducing the EMP model— Emerging, Mentee, and Peer learners—as a practical way to personalize facilitation across generations. Speakers highlighted how adults arrive with distinct experiences and motivations, and how instruction gains power when it meets learners where they are: confidence-building for newcomers, mentorship and collaboration for mid-career professionals, and reciprocal expertise-sharing for veterans.

Participants explored four practice moves— Co-learning, Critical Critique, Creation-Centered tasks, and Career Connection—ready for classrooms, trainings, and online use. Examples included collaborative intros, concept mapping, interview practice, and portfolio boosts, all anchored in ethical Al. The throughline was equity: ensuring all learners can evaluate, apply, and disclose Al, keeping instruction human-centered, relevant, transparent, and career-aligned.
