




#### **Dual Channels**

"People have separate channels for processing visual/pictorial material and auditory/verbal material" (35).




### Limited Capacity

"People can actively process only a few pieces of information in each channel at one time" (35).




"Learning occurs when people engage in appropriate cognitive processing during learning" (35).







This week's reading focuses on learning theory. Pay attention to page 35. We will use this chapter to help us move from thesis idea to thesis statement.






### **Building Rapport**

"Online classes can have a disconnected feel to them, but my professor did the best job I've seen of closing that gap."





### **Building Rapport Now**

### **Emergency Remote Teaching**

- Send a check in survey
- Send personal emails
- Adjust expectations to be more flexible and communicate that to students

### **Building Rapport Later**

#### **Future Online Classes**

- Learn about mail merge
- Design assignments for personal feedback
- Create opportunities for connection through groups, discussion boards, assignments
